## For your child's bedroom

Most kids bedrooms today are used both for sleeping as well as homework and recreation. Try avoiding overhead lighting and consider dimmer switches along with desk and floor lamps. Try placing the various light fixtures in a triangular formation.

Never put window treatments that have cords as this poses a child safety risk. There are many options available today for blinds and shades that operate without cords. When choosing window treatments, consider how much privacy is needed, depending on which way each window is facing.

Playtime is the best time for most kids. Carpeting or area rugs, if you have wood floors, are a great choice to provide for a comfort-

able playing area. Smaller toys require creative storage so adding clear plastic stackable bins will keep things organized and conserve space. If using colored bins and your child is too young to read, tape a picture of the toys to the outside of the container so they can help when it's time for clean up

Painting a picture or mural on a wall can be 'more unique' than adding wallpaper. The design can be as simple as a logo from a favorite sports team, a picture of their favorite animal or a mural covering an entire wall. The more input you allow the child, the better the end result will be. If you are not confident with painting freehand and are not ready to hire a professional painter, you can still attempt the project yourself. If a larger image is needed, try projecting the im-

age onto the wall with a film projector and copy the outline with chalk. If you need to copy a smaller image, carbon transfer papers are available in different colors. The colored carbon papers allow you to trace the lighter colors on darker walls and vice versa, and these are easy to use.

Adding a desk to a child's bedroom is a great way to get them to hit the books more often, but often limited floor space creates a challenge. A solution I tried in a teenager's room was to utilize the closet. After removing the double bi-fold doors, we installed a Formica countertop from wall to wall to serve as the desktop. When drawers are needed, place one or two file cabinets underneath and have the countertop sit on top.
